Ardmore M. E., South, 1925-1930: Growing Pains of a Young Church

Returning to "ordinary" Christian work after a successful building program and consecration of a new sanctuary can be a bit of a letdown. The five years following the departure of Dr. Hiatt were no exception, as Ardmore struggled with debt and how to find her way. Her new pastor, the Rev. L.B. Hayes, understood the challenges and growing pains of the young church. He held a Thanksgiving morning service at 8 a.m. and invited those who normally spent the holiday hunting to attend in their hunting gear before heading out. He was popular and gracious when the church members fell behind in paying his salary, and encouraging of the young church. Ardmore adored Rev. Hayes and supported him when his wife, Agnes, died of complications following the birth of their fourth child. He "bore his grief nobly" and told a friend, "the anchor holds," citing his faith as a comfort. Construction of a parsonage adjacent to the sanctuary was in process and a unanimous request had been made that he be returned when it was announced he would be moved to Centenary-West End in October 1927.

The new pastor, Rev. M.T. Smathers, was well-known for his staunch belief in strict adherence to the Methodist Discipline; he knew it well and followed it exactly. His personal behavior and character were beyond reproach, although his Puritanical views perhaps did not mesh well with the young, forward-thinking Ardmore congregation. In particular, he took exception to the congregation's habit of catching up as able in paying his salary. C.C. Smithdeal noted in *Ardmore*

United Methodist: Birth of a Church that Rev. Smathers announced from the pulpit in September 1928 that if the congregation did not pay his salary to date, he would not be returning, and said philosophically, "We paid him but he never returned. We decided he just wasn't our man." He was one of only two pastors in Ardmore's first century to serve just one year at our church.

The appointment of Rev. W.A. Rollins was greeted with enthusiasm; the women of the church had the parsonage all ready and a meal to greet the new pastor's family. It was a challenging time with the stock market crash coinciding with the necessity of merging Centenary and West End Methodist Churches, but Ardmore continued to grow under Rev. Rollins' leadership. It was noted that a full-time janitor was now needed by the church and that the number of bulletins being mimeographed for Sunday services needed to be increased from 200 to 250 to match the demand. During Rev. Rollins' tenure, a Boy Scout troop, #49, was added, led by Banks Newman; today known as Troop 749, it is the oldest troop in continuous existence in Forsyth County. The Women's Missionary Society took on the responsibility of paying the additional apportionments to help the men of the church meet our obligations during 1930.

This is My Father's World

When I first offered to participate with Ardmore Church's effort to take care of the Earth I thought it was called Earth Care. Only later did I realize it's called Creation Care. The difference is immediately obvious. We do need to take care of the Earth—because that's where we live. And when we're dead and gone our children and grandchildren will still live here. (With the possible exception that a few might make it to Mars with Elon Musk's crew.) But thinking of this place as the Father's Creation should change our motivation. We must never grow tired of that. Here are the lyrics to the hymn, "This is My Father's World," written by Maltbie D. Babcock in 1901. (It can be found in most traditional hymnals.)

This is my Father's world:
And to my listening ears
All nature sings, and round me rings
The music of the spheres.
This is my Father's world:
I rest me in the thought
Of rocks and trees, of skies and seas-His hand the wonders wrought.

This is my Father's world:
The birds their carols raise,
The morning light, the lily whit,
Declare their Maker's praise.
This is my Father's world:
He shines in all that's fair;
In rustling grass I hear Him pass,
He speaks to me everywhere.

It ends with "He speaks to me everywhere." But if we don't have listening ears, as in the second line, we may not hear when He speaks. Or if we don't have observing eyes, we may see but fail to notice.

Dear Brothers and Sisters, let's be intentional about enjoying the wonderfully beautiful home the Father has prepared for us, and with gratitude do our part to care for it. On the next page are ten simple suggestions.

- 1) Bring natural beauty into your home: wall pictures and calendars of nature, backgrounds on phone and computer screens, house plants and flower arrangements. Beautiful arrangements can be made without flowers using leaves, branches, and weeds, even in the winter. Change them regularly. As you select and pick items remember to thank the Father.
- 2) Practice conversations to observe with gratitude the Father's love-gifts from nature. When you observe, "It's a beautiful Day," follow up with, "The Father Is Smiling at Us." Or "It looks like it's gonna rain on our picnic...I guess the Father thinks it's time for the world's bath."
- 3) Start family (or personal) traditions like "Wednesday is Walk in the World Day" or every Sunday after church take the long way home that goes by a river, through woods, or over hills. Stop and smell the roses.
- 4) Play Creation games. Nature 20 questions: "I'm looking at something that the Father made. Can you guess it?" Or more generally, "I'm looking at something; can you guess it?" and the first question is, "Did the Father make it?" Yes or No, and then proceed with question 2.
- 5) Scavenger Hunt: Make a list of things to find in nature. For example look for an acorn, a seed, a pine cone, a berry, something yellow, something cold, something flat, something pointy, etc. Or prepare a nature activity check list: hear a bird call, sit on a log, throw a stone into water, eat something wild (not a mushroom unless you're sure it's safe), hug a tree, say a prayer under an oak tree, trace the shape of your hand on dead wood, stack rocks, hold hands walking across a field, write your name in sand, walk along a path backwards.
- 6) Go on a photo safari—you will likely see beauty where you would not have otherwise noticed it. Then spend some time together looking at each other's pictures. The first time go out in your own yard or neighborhood, then go to different locations.
- 7) Pick a spot between your door and mailbox where you can regularly greet the Father. Assume He's waiting for you there and stop and greet Him. Share how your day is going. I recommend not using this time for making requests, but express gratitude. You might hear Him tell you that He loves you.
- 8) Grow a garden, if necessary in boxes or buckets on a porch. Include both items for consumption and beauty. Give it a name like New Eden, God's Grove, Father's Farm, Glory Garden, or Nature's Nook. Say hello to the Father when you go to it.
- 9) Take Trash Treks. Carry a brown paper bag in your pocket so you can pick up pieces of trash when you see them. Then empty the bag when you get to a trash can and put it back in your pocket. A family Trash Trek can be fun where everyone works together to feed the hungry trash can.
- 10) Draw a card or poster for your night stand. State on the front that in the morning you're going to love the Father by making His creation better and more beautiful today. Then turn it over and on the back ask yourself if you did make it better or more beautiful today.

In The Lord's Prayer, Jesus taught us to pray, "...thy will be done on Earth as it is in Heaven." Let's make Earth as much like Heaven as we possibly can.
