What Does Re-Opening Look Like?

Phase Two: April 2021

- Masks and physical distancing required throughout the property at all times.
 - Worship:
 - Livestream Worship for 10am and 11:15am
 - Lay readers will be allowed in indoor worship services.
 - **Checkinz** registration required upon arrival. Volunteers will assist check in with temperature checks, registration for contact tracing, asking COVID-19 Questions (Have you been around anyone with COVID or tested positive for COVID in the last 14 days?), and attendance.
 - In addition, limited worship outdoors will be allowed for Easter Vigil and Sunrise Service.
 - Essential day to day operations, giving/donations (drive thru & drop off only).
 - In-person Worship Planning and practice for worship leaders
 - Food Pantry (drive-thru pick-up and delivery)
 - Office hours are Monday through Thursday 9:00am to 4:45 pm.
 - **NEW Additional Guidelines for April:**
 - Outdoor activities under 100 people, indoor activities under 25 people may resume, which includes weekday/night small groups & committee meetings.
 - Weekday/night small groups (United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women Circles, Stitchers, Young at Heart, Connect Youth, Connect Kids, Wednesday studies) and committees must schedule their activities with the Church Administrator, Brandi Baran (admin@ardmoreumc.org)
 - **Checkinz** registration required upon arrival or sign-in sheet for specific groups with contact tracing, COVID questions, and temperature checks.
 - Persons on site are asked to only utilize the Unisex Restroom on the 2nd floor of the West wing.

Phase Three: May 2021

- Masks and physical distancing required throughout the property at all times.
- Essential day to day operations, giving/donations (drive thru & drop off only).
 - In-person Worship Planning and practice for worship leaders
 - Food Pantry (drive-thru pick-up and delivery)
 - Office hours are Monday through Thursday 9:00am to 4:45 pm.
- **NEW Additional Guidelines for May:**
 - Worship:
 - Livestream only for 10 am worship service with additional Lay Readers in place.
 - In person worship for 11:15 am worship outdoors (under 100 people per CDC and Governor Cooper guidelines).
 - Volunteers will assist check in with temperature checks, registration for contact tracing, asking COVID-19 Questions (Have you been

- around anyone with COVID or tested positive for COVID in the last 14 days?), and attendance or **Checkinz** registration required.
- Sunday morning small groups (Sunday School/Unity Groups) may resume
 - All groups (Sunday School, Unity Groups, and all listed in Phase 2) must schedule their activities with the Church Administrator, Brandi Baran (admin@ardmoreumc.org)
 - **Checkinz** registration required upon arrival or sign-in sheet for specific groups with contact tracing, COVID questions, and temperature checks.
 - Persons on site are asked to only utilize the Unisex Restroom on the 2nd floor of the West wing.

Phase Four: June 2021

- Masks and physical distancing required throughout the property at all times.
 - Essential day to day operations, giving/donations (drive thru & drop off only).
 - In-person Worship Planning and practice for worship leaders
 - Food Pantry (drive-thru pick-up and delivery)
 - Office hours are Monday through Thursday 9:00am to 4:45 pm.
 - **NEW Additional Guidelines for June:**
 - Worship:
 - In-person worship services at 10 am in Sanctuary and 11:15 am in Chapel.
 - Both with limited capacity numbers.
 - Sanctuary physical distancing limited to 100 people downstairs and 68 upstairs or 30% of total capacity is 131.
 - Chapel limited to 50 people physically distanced or 30% capacity is 30 people.
 - Volunteers will assist check in with temperature checks, registration for contact tracing, asking COVID-19 Questions (Have you been around anyone with COVID or tested positive for COVID in the last 14 days?) and attendance.

Phase Five: TBD

- Masks and physical distancing required throughout the property at all times.
 - Worship:
 - Continue from Phase 4
 - **NEW Additional Guidelines for Phase 5:**
 - Limited numbers in areas such as Food Pantry & Clothing Closet, Scouting, Swahili Church, Nursery, and any other areas of ministry, mission and Christian Education.
 - Church food and drink will not be currently offered for some time.

A Note from the Outreach Pastor

I have been continuing my seminary education at Hood Theological Seminary, taking two classes each semester. Last semester I attended classes via Zoom on Friday evenings and this Spring semester I have been attending on Saturday mornings. It has been a full load but I am truly thankful to be able to get my education. I am finishing up a Christian Ethics class this semester, which has been excellent. We read a book called "Doing Christian Ethics from the Margins" by Miguel A. De La Torre. This book has helped to reshape some of my views of ministry. It says, "If a society is marked by injustice and oppression, the ethics produced by that society's center will never lead to justice and freedom. Justice and freedom must instead flow from the ethics of the margins, where experiential, first-hand knowledge of the injustice and oppression emanating from the center is acquired." How important our work as a Church and as a community, to come alongside, to journey with those on the margins, to choose the Jesus way.

De La Torre says, "For those doing ethics from the margins, the issue is not to determine some abstract understanding of what is ethical, but rather, in the face of dehumanizing oppressive structures, to determine how people of faith adapt their actions to serve the least among us. Ethics becomes the process by which the marginalized enter a more human condition by overcoming oppressive or controlling societal mechanisms."

Our location here at Ardmore, in our neighborhood and in our city, provides us a unique opportunity for ministry. May we listen and respond to the Holy Spirit's bold calls to ministry on the margins and may we be willing to listen, learn, and love.

Christ is Alive

*"In every insult, rift and war,
where color, scorn or wealth divide,
Christ suffers still, yet loves the more,
and lives, where even hope has died."*



Christ has risen! Christ has risen indeed! Alleluia! In this fifty-day season of Eastertide, it can often be difficult to balance the sheer joy of the resurrection with the hurt and brokenness of our world. There is much to celebrate with Christ's triumph over death including effective vaccine distribution and the hope for more in-person gatherings, including worship. However, there are still many problems in our world that persist in this season of Easter, including systemic racism, sexism, and hate-filled rhetoric. How do we, as an Easter people, balance these seemingly opposite sentiments?

In the hymn "Christ is Alive!" Brian Wren tries to tackle this issue of mourning social injustices with the resurrected Christ. This hymn was created for Easter Sunday in 1968. Just ten days earlier on April 4th 1968, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee. Although Dr. Wren was an English minister serving a parish in Essex, England, he and his parishioners were shocked by the violent assassination of the leader of the non-violent movement for civil rights. Not only was Dr. Wren faced with the difficult task of preaching on this horrific event alongside the risen Christ, but he also had to find a hymn that reflected this juxtaposition.

Unfortunately, the church can oftentimes seem out-of-touch to reality, where the organ can mask the cries of pains of a suffering world and the stained-glass windows can shield the realities taking place on the streets outside. Finding no better alternative, Dr. Wren decided to pen his own hymn, "I tried to express an Easter hope out of that terrible event, in words which could be more widely applied, and wrote 'Christ is alive!' because our available hymns spoke of Easter as a glorious event long ago, far away, and high above."

Indeed, we are resurrection people who claim that Jesus Christ is risen *today*, yet we still mourn all the injustices of our church, our community, and our world. Let us remember that we are capable of holding joy in one hand alongside sorrow in the other. Even the risen Christ bore wounds that had not fully healed. During this season of Eastertide, may we fully rejoice in the splendor of the resurrection while keeping our hearts and minds engaged in the constant work of justice.
